About State Legislators

- □ 7,383 legislators and 25,000 legislative staff
- 20% turnover each election
- Citizen vs. "Professional" legislatures
- Generalists, but usually have a priority issue
 - 500 16,000 bills introduced in one session (WY-NY)
- Problem solvers
- Normal people!

What do Legislators Care About

- Solving problems
 - Want to understand problems and find solutions
- Using data and research
 - Want to know what works and how much it will cost
- Learning from others
 - Want to know what other states are doing
- Responding to constituent concerns
 - Want to know the impact on their district




- Reach out to them (within protocol)
- Provide facts and figures as well as the story
- Be clear about the legislative role
- Know what you need, how much it will cost and how it will be paid for
- □ Know the rules and process
- Know the context



Partisan Composition and 2016 Election

2016 Election Stats:

- 5,917 legislative seats were up
- 1,263 new legislators were elected
- On average, around 20% of legislators are new each election






- Since Obergefell... not much happening

Gender Neutral Language


- General Language Changes
- Birth Certificates
 - A few states have statutes
 - Mostly non-statutory amendments to vital records forms
- Marital Presumptions
 - CA, DC, IL, ME, NH, WA
- Application/Interpretation of Existing Law
 DC, MN, NH, OR, RI, VT, WA have statutes on statutory construction



- ME, NM, ND, OK, TX, UT, WA, WY
- De Facto Parentage
- Assisted Reproduction

Incarceration and Child Support

- Currently, every states has a procedure for criminal and civil contempt for failure to pay child support.
- States to the right allow for modification during incarceration.



Incarceration and Child Support

- 19 states introduced 46 bills in 2017
 - Reentry Services: mainly job training
 - Suspension and Modification during Incarceration: some automatically by operation of law
 - Information Sharing: notifying inmates of modification procedures
 - Work Release/Work While Incarcerated/Alternatives to Incarceration
 - Contempt/Ability to Pay
 - Criminal Penalties
 - Parent Programs/Children of Incarcerated Parents Programs




Cooperation Requirements

Child Care

- 2017 legislation in North Carolina and Washington
- 2016 legislation enacted in Colorado, Kansas and North Carolina
- 6 states have in statute (NY is recommendation)
- 13 states have in regulation
- SNAP
 - **7** states (FL, ID, KS, MA, MI, NE, OH)
 - 2017: 11 states have introduced legislation (AL, AK, AR, IN, MS, NH, NC, SC, SD, WV, WI)





- More than 800 bills have been introduced in 2017 so far
- Enforcement: driver's licenses
- Workforce Development
- Fatherhood/Healthy Family Relationships: primarily funding for programs
- Custody and Visitation: grandparents, military parents, shared parenting/joint custody
- Parental Rights and Sexual Assault
- Pass-Through and Disregard (MD S 1009, MA S 30, MAH1952)
- Parentage: establishment, disestablishment, putative fathers, assisted reproduction
